<p>Abstract</p> 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Educational Video Clips explaining how asbestos fibers inhaled into the human lung can cause deadly diseases are available in the languages as noted below. The original Japanese and English versions were made by the Japan Environmental Restoration and Conservation Agency (ERCA) and other language versions were produced by the Asian Ban Asbestos Network (A-BAN). - The Hong Kong Workers Health Centre (HK WHC) in cooperation with the Pneumoconiosis Compensation Fund developed a series of educational booklets on the prevention of asbestos exposure. Such booklets have been and are being developed by various organizations in many countries but in this case, an explanatory video/ CDs are also made and attached to the booklets. - Multinational cooperation on asbestos education and training is increasing at various levels; a good example of this at the grass roots level is the “Asbestos Precautionary Program by Local Empowerment (APPLE)” project by the Can Tho Medical College (CMC), the Center for Occupational Health and Environment (ECHO), the Education and Communication Center (ECC), Vietnam and the Tokyo Occupational Safety and Health Center, Japan.
